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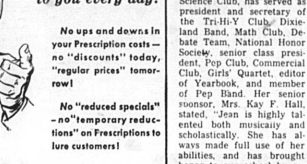

"A Little Better Than Plumb" is a picture of the world's largest collection of militaria. The park takes its name from Levi Jackson, a pioneer, and the Wilderness Road, which was traced and blazed by Daniel Boone.

The park has a true early 18th century mountain-life museum complete with not one, but a group of farm buildings depicting the country life of a century ago. There is a manor house with a dog trot, an enclosed passageway between the cooking and serving areas of the early pioneer dwellings, a kitchen and smoke house, a loom house, blacksmith shop, and a two-pen barn. The buildings house many interesting household furnishings and, by the way, many of which were donated by the families of the neighboring communities.

There is a collection of antique rifles, early Indian artifacts, and a tool chest. The park offers a modern swimming pool and bath house, accommodations for trailer and tent camping, and an extensive picnic ground for the children, and you may even enjoy a horseback ride, a carriage ride, or perhaps a hike across part of Henry's Trace. Vacation time is now, so keep Levi Jackson Wilderness Road State Park in mind, an inspiring and interesting place for the entire family to visit.
