Reflections on Loyalty and Appreciation.

The Editor of this paper does not profess to be a political analyst, nor does he often reach a point where he feels that he has the words of wisdom to offer. However, in a situation presents itself so plainly, he feels he should write to speak through the columns of his newspaper to his fellow citizens. More than one and one-quarter million dollars worth of major equipment has been purchased for the county's own equipment because of a new "cooperative plan" worked out by the State Highway Department. Isn't that what we wanted?

2. A 4-H camp located in Nicholas County isn't anyone of twenty-one other counties that were actively seeking it, but our own county was the only one to do for it. It taught us how to work together as a team, it taught us that we can raise money on a county-wide basis when we are doing it on a county-wide basis. It will bring us new business and will stimulate our economy, but best of all it will be a training place for the young people who will be our leaders of tomorrow.

3. A lake project that will create a 150 acre lake to attract more citizens to our community, that will provide employment in its development of fishing, boating, and other recreational activities; that will attract tourists who will stop and spend money in our county, and who will be the benefactor of The County as a whole in the future. This project is being financed by a bond issue controlled by a non-profit group that is working for good of the County as a whole.

4. A new Nicholas County Library and new Regional Library. Yes, Nicholas County is the only one in the state for these new cultural facilities. Four other counties had libraries in 1960, but Nicholas County obtained it. Do we want to stay here?

5. A removal of unsightly places along our roads by the removal of a law requiring junk dealers to move back from the highways 200 feet. This law was helped on its way by joint action of women in this county who will all be considerably better off because of the beauty of our State.

The raising of educational standards for our teachers, who, until the last three years migrated to other states faster than we could train them, because they could not earn a decent living in our own State. Yes, even the final merging of all of our school systems into one single unit can be credited to foresighted men who had the guidance and leadership of present State Educational officials.

7. Help for the elderly which was never possible before in the form of increased monthly benefits, hospital, medical, dental, and drug now available that were unheard of before 1960, is what our elderly people want, or do they want to go back to the time when they had had less, less, less, less, less, less, less, less, less, less, or at all? To the contrary, we want to go even farther so that they can live in decency and dignity in their elderly days.

8. A new swimming pool at Blue Licks State Park. Are not all of these things to the citizens' good?

This newspaper subscribes to the mutual good of that much backbone for the things. Loyalty to a friend, neighbor, or your fellow man is something that is not to be treated lightly. Loyalty to your country is something that has enjoyed these last four years is something that is not to be treated lightly. We are loyal and appreciate the good things that have been done for us under the present administration. We must realize that the newspaper notes again that we probably carry a duty to see that this progress continues, and to do this, it would appear that we owe our votes on May 26, the Primary and Edward T. Yas! Yas!—You are here more plants in your tobacco bed this year than you can use, choose them. There probably will be a shortage of plants this year. Dry weather in the plant growing season cut down the tobacco crop.

That considerably. Call the Extension Office to report any excess plants on hand, after this 30 x 75 little corner lot had two crop trees, an apple tree, two pear trees and one plum tree that no longer exist, but the honeyuckle is still strutting.

Uncooked Strawberry Jam  
2 cups of jelly made from 4 cups of sugar, 1 package of powdered pectin (such as Certo or Sure-Jell), 1 cup of water.

Combine the fruit with water. Let stand about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir the pectin into the water, bring to boiling and boil rapidly for 1 minute, stirring constantly.

Remove from heat, add the fruit and stir about 2 minutes. Pour into sterilized jelly glasses. Cover and let stand at room temperature until jelled. — perhaps overcooked or longer. Seal with paraffin and store in your freezer.

Strawberry Preserves  
Wash strawberries by lifting and out of running water. Drain in a colander. Measure 4 heaping cups of berries and place in the saucepan. Add 1 T. of vinegar to berries; cover and boil 1 min. Remove lid and add 4 cups sugar and boil 20 min. or until done. Test by jelly test (place a small amount (1 T.) on a cold saucer and let set a few minutes or when two drops run together as one when using a cold spoon. Pour into tray or shallow pan. Let set overnight. Put in sterilized jars and cover with paraffin.

Strawberries are now showing retail fruit counters in selecting strawberries for home use, choose a solid red, glossy berry attached to a bright green cap. The berry should be free from decay and dirt.

This uncooked strawberry jam makes a nice topping for ice cream or serve with hot biscuits or toast. It will keep three months in the refrigerator or a year or more in the deep freeze.
