The first government controlled lunch room in our community was at the East Union consolidated school. In 1939 East Union began serving a warm, well balanced meal for 5¢ daily. This project was founded on faith and began on scratch.

To operate such a program the first requirement was someone to sponsor it. At that time the school board felt it couldn't be done so, so little, so the social worker explained that the teachers and three interested parents would be permitted to sponsor it. Mrs. Nelle Brayfield, principal, Miss Effie Anderson, Miss Cordia Bell and Mrs. Ethel Hollon teachers, and three parents immediately signed for the project.

A pantry shower was given by the school. Each child brought his own dishes. Judge Shepherd and the local court donated some cast away tables which the 4-H Club refinished. The club also bought a new dish cabinet.

Mrs. Agnes Crawford and a Mrs. Guiley were our first help, paid by the government.

The government commodities consisted of meat, potatoes, cabbage, dried beans, fruits and juices. These were delivered to the school by our principal and bus driver. Interested parents donated fresh fruits and vegetables weekly.

After a most delicious dinner these good parents sent the dressed chickens early enough that they could be cooked and served at noon.

The entire school "took off" at 1:00 p.m. (the last
