By virtue of a judgment and order of sale of the Nicholas Circuit Court, entered in the above styled action at the September, 1963 Term of said Court, the undersigned Master Commissioner will, on the 9th day of November, 1963, at or about the hour of 2:00 o'clock, P. M., at the Court House door, in Carlisle, Kentucky, offer for sale to the highest and best bidder, for cash, or on a credit of six and twelve months from date of sale, the following described property:

"A certain lot or parcel of land with all improvements thereon, lying in and known as Pickerville, a suburb of Carlisle, Nicholas County, Kentucky, and bounded and described as follows: on the North by Main Street of Pickerville; on the West by the alley separating this lot from the lot of Wallace Hughes; on the South by alley way joining Henryville and Pickerville and on the East by lot of George Duncan (now America Bohino) said lot fronting 60 feet, more or less, on said Main Street and running back the same width One Hundred and Twenty feet (120), more or less, to said alley way between Pickerville and Henryville."

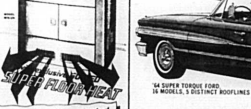
