plan for American oceanographic research. It will mean an increase in men, laboratories, and ships for exploring and exploiting the briny deep and should result in providing us with a greater knowledge of the sea for defense, for food, and for science.
 The program could also study underwater experimental stations for mining on continental shelves and devices permitting deep-sea mining. The Bureau of Mines hopes to undertake an underwater Lewis and

Clark expedition" to find oil and metal resources, perhaps with a manned deep submersible craft.
 With respect to the nation's defense, studies under the program would range from investigating sea conditions that affect antisubmarine warfare, to mapping the underwater mountains where future submarines might hide.
 The Committee on Oceanography stated that through greater knowledge, we could increase fivefold the amount

of fish we are taking from the ocean. The program would include the study of below-surface "farm" for cultivating fish and would hope to establish forecasting systems to aid in increasing fish catches.
 Over half of the money for the decade-long program would be devoted to basic research.
 The plan for oceanographic research will provide many, new exciting jobs of exploration for scientists and engineers. Perhaps some of the young men in

Kentucky, interested in pioneering the unknown, will participate in this program during the next decade. For centuries, the lure of the sea has beckoned to man and, apparently, still does.

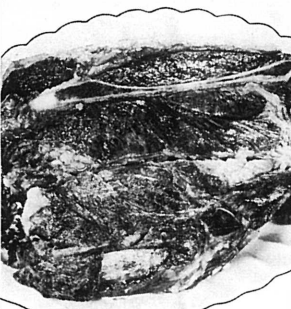
