Touring Scenic Kentucky The Campaign To Make Kentucky A Cleaner, Greener Land

Kentuckians are proud of their progress on the program to "Make Kentucky A Cleaner, Greener Land," but they are not slowing down. It began in 1960 and in January, 1962, Governor Bert Combs was presented the National Keep America Beautiful, Inc. award in New York.

Kentucky was the first state to receive it.

In May, 1962, Kentucky won the National Council of State Garden Clubs' BRONZE SEAL AWARD in Los Angeles for the floral clock and the beautification of the capitol grounds in Frankfort.

Recently, a state-wide clean-up and beautification meeting was held in Frankfort with about 200 members of civic clubs, chambers of commerce, home-makers and garden clubs, etc. from all over Kentucky attending. They were addressed by Mr. Edgar J. Forto, senior vice president of the Coca-Cola Co. and a vice president of Keep America Beautiful, Inc. He said a cleaner, greener, more beautiful state can play a great part toward solving its economic problems by being attractive to new industry. He added that Kentucky's program is one of the best coordinated he has ever seen.

The group approved Governor Combs urging to "work even harder to keep our roads and streets clean, plant more flowers, shrubs and trees spruce up our stores and keep our public buildings in good repair."

You, as an individual can help make Kentucky a cleaner, greener land by remembering when you tour scenic Kentucky, to use a "litter bag" rather than the highway and to "discover" rather than "cover" her beautiful scenery.

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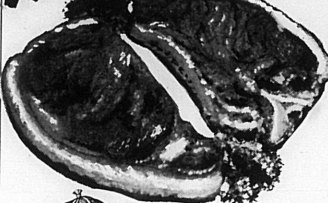
