

**"Conserving Use" Provision**  
Continued Under '64  
**Feed Grain Program**  
Growers who intend to participate in the 1964 feed grain program should remember that eligibility for payments and price support will be conditional upon maintaining the farm's normal acreage (1959-60 average) in soil-conserving crops or practices, including summer fallow and idle land.

The same provision has been in effect for the feed grain programs during the past three years.

H. S. Vice, Chairman, "Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee," points out that this provision is of particular importance to the feed grain grower who also produces wheat.

Eligibility for feed grain program benefits in 1964 is not contingent on staying within the wheat allotment. If any, for the sized farm, he explained. However, the normal acreage in conserving use under the feed grain program will mean that a planter of wheat in excess of the farm allotment on a competing feed grain farm would have to be at the expense of some other soil-depleting crop.

Growers participating in the 1964 feed grain program, as in last year's program, will be eligible for diversion payments, price support loans on their corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

and special price-support payments. Also, as before, two rates of diversion payment will be offered, but the higher rate may be applied to more acreage in 1964.

Mr. Vice invites feed grain and wheat producers to keep in touch with the ASCS County Office for further information as the program develops.
