MMI Mess Hall Razed By Fire Tuesday Morning
Fire believed to have been caused by electrical equipment destroyed a mess hall in the Millerburg Military Institute about 12:15 a.m. Tuesday. The loss was set at \$150,000.
The one-story brick veneer building with hard pine interior built in 1922 was quickly consumed by flames fed from bottled gas in the kitchen.
Fire-fighting rigs from Millerburg and Bourbon County answered the alarm. The fire was extinguished two cadets looking out some 100 feet from the mess hall. One reported the fire to the Central Kentucky fire department—the other attempted to smother the flames with a fire extinguisher by standing outside the mess hall.
Cadets at present are using the mess facilities at the junction school through Friday evening, October 18.
