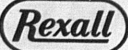


Girl Scouts

state during the year by the three agencies to about 1,130,254 acres. Soil survey maps show the location of the various kinds of soil on each segment of land as well as the slope of the land and the amount of erosion that has occurred. Also, interpretations of the soils for different uses and treatment are furnished users of soil surveys. Mr. Taft stated that soil surveys serve as a basis for the conservation work done by the Soil Conservation Service. "We are pleased to note that, in addition to the agricultural interest, there is an increased awareness on the part of non-agricultural people, such as planning commissioners, appraisers, engineers, foresters, bankers, realtors, and so on, of the importance of soil surveys." Mr. Taft stated: "Any planning of land use must take into account the properties of the soil, as these properties determine the soil's suitability for various uses." He noted that the soil surveys indicate the suitability of areas for different uses.

for septic tanks to function well. "This use of soil surveys, only one of many, is of utmost concern to planning commissions and individuals buying homes who want to avoid costly, unsanitary conditions associated with failure of the soil to absorb the effluent from septic tanks," he stated. He named the Northern Kentucky Area Planning Commission, Newport, Kentucky, and the City-County Planning Commission, of Lexington and Fayette county, as examples of non-agricultural users that have recently made requests of the Soil Conservation Service for soil surveys. Taft concluded, "Competition for the use of land will increase greatly as our population continues to increase, and the use of the scientific soils information provided by soil surveys can avert many errors in land use and help assure orderly, healthful growth of our communities."
