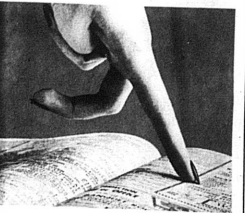

Wild Turkeys

Frankfort—Two Wild turkey gobblers hunting season in different parts of the state, are to be opened later this month. Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, reported today.

A three-day season, April 23, 25 and 27, will be permitted on certain designated sections of Kentucky Woodlands National Wildlife Refuge from 8 a. m. until 11 a. m. with only one turkey gobbler to be taken per hunter during the entire season. Hunters must check in and out of the hunting area at a check station and may use only shotguns not larger than 12 gauge. Slugs are prohibited. The total season kill is limited to 25 birds.

The other season, for gobblers will be held in the following counties or portions of counties: That portion of Pulaski and Mr. Creary, east of U. S. Route 21, north of Kentucky Route 80 and south of Kentucky Route 80 (excepting the Beaver Creek Wildlife Man-

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agement Area), Perry, Breathitt, Knott (including Robinson Forest Wildlife Management Area), Clay and Leslie (including Ford Wildlife Management Area), that portion of Jackson County lying west of U. S. Route 421, Wolfe, Powell and that portion of Menifee County lying south of U. S. Route 460.

Dates for this season are April 24, 25, 26, 27 and 28 or until such time as 50 gobblers are harvested. The area to be hunted is clearly outlined and shotguns only, no larger than 12 gauge or smaller than 20 gauge may be used. Slugs are prohibited in this area also. Use of dogs in both hunts is barred and hunters must have a valid Kentucky hunting license. After a hunter has bagged his bird he will not be permitted to assist a partner in quest of his game.

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Strawberry Picking Time

Conway Gilvin is one of the 14 people who have purchased strawberry plants this spring. Mr. Gilvin lives on Sharnsberg Route 1 and reports that he is going to have some good eating next spring when he starts picking his first crop of strawberries.

Mr. Gilvin didn't say just who was going to set out the plants he purchased or take care of them this summer but he did indicate that he was going to expect help from some of the other members of his family. 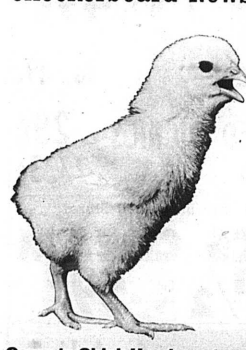
