price-support loans averaging \$1.30 a bushel nationally, and (3) marketing certificates — with a cash value of 70 cents per bushel for domestic and 25 cents for export — for a large part of the farm's 1964 wheat production. The chairman explained that wheat producers who wish to take part in the voluntary program will need to sign up at the ASCS County Office, there will be no "automatic" participation. Only those wheat producers who sign up and carry out provisions of the program will be eligible for the program benefits. The sign-up now is underway, and will extend through May 15, 1964. Winter wheat growers, as well as spring wheat growers, will be eligible to take part in the 1964 program.

Mr. Vice pointed out that this will be particularly easy for those growers who have planted within their 1964 allotments, since they have already met one of the conditions necessary for participation. Such growers will need to fulfill other conditions for qualifying as a "participant" however, such as devoting acreage diverted from wheat to conserving uses, keeping with other crop allotments, and maintaining their normal conserving base acres. "Signing up is the first step to taking part in the 1964 wheat program," the chairman emphasized. "Because the season is so late, there will be no advance payments made this year, but the diversion payments will be made and the certain wheat income as possible after performance has been checked.
