Dear Family and Friends,

As it is summer, and 4-H members all over America are camping, so it is in Norway, also. I have just attended the Norwegian National 4-H Camp, held at 500 boys and girls from all over Norway. The camp site was on a large island in Norway's largest lake, Mjøsa.

And the camping was the real kind, tents for everyone, with bathing in the lake.

While at the camp, I was amazed at the Norwegian people, as I have been since my stay in Norway. The weather was unusually cold, 40 degrees F. and under, yet the camp still functioned as though it was truly summer.

The volley ball games continued even through rain, and general assemblies with the group were held with a success and unbroken over head.

Being an IYFC, and particularly interested in 4-H camp work myself, I found many similarities with the camping in Norway and Kentucky. There was singing in both each assembly and the volley ball games were conducted the same as in our American camps.

There was folk dancing, and lots of it. I had always imagined 250 a large group for dancing, but 500 were doing so here in the Norwegian Camp, and without confusion! Many of the dances are the same that 4-Hers in the states learn, but many are the traditional Norwegian folk dances.

Each 4-H camper brought his own plate, silverware and ran to the camp site. One hot meal was prepared in a nearby town and brought to the camp. Food was served on the "assembly line" and it was good, hearty camp food. But the children didn't go hungry for breakfast and lunch they bought (bread and butter) at a small concession stand on the camp grounds. Their milk was given to them. This is quite different. I felt from the American camp where three meals are served a day and a "snack" stand is not needed to sell food. The campers were quite satisfied with the situation. Then, after eating, it was to the lake to wash dishes! Each person takes care of his own. The water, I was told had been

tested before the camp began and was found to be nearly perfectly pure.

Camp fires and 4-H camp games in hand, and the Norwegian camp was no exception. Every evening there was one large camp fire and the boys and girls gathered around it to sing informally. To me, not only was it beautiful, but also very warm! The fire, the singing, the lake surrounded by high mountains in the distance—this was the perfect setting for ending each camping day.

For a special Saturday night program, the leaders had prepared many small fires up and down the lake shore. The boys and girls were given hot dogs (in Norwegian, polser) and there was a polser roast! Hot dogs are the same as American ones, but you just can't get such good Norwegian bread in America!

The camp ran very smoothly the entire week. The 4-Hers have more free time of their own than at an American 4-H camp, but they spent the time getting to know each other. Instead of regular scheduled instruction each day by leaders, the older 4-H members were given the time to help the entire group on such things as setting up tents, the proper way of walking, lifting, and sitting and instructing in nature.

Norway's 4-H Club is so similar to that in the United States. The name, the emblem, the pledge and the flag are the same. How good it was to see the 4-H flag, the Norwegian flag and the American flag flying together!

I feel that in Norway I have seen true camping. The people are accustomed to this and they enjoy doing it. Traveling through the country in summer one can see tents all around. Even the farmers pack up and go camping for a short while. So, through my camping experience, I feel closer to the Norwegian people and their way of living.
