The signup started August 24 and it will extend through October 2, 1964.

Operation of the 1965 program generally will be about the same as for 1963. Mr. Vico pointed out, but some provisions have been modified. The program is again entirely voluntary and is more flexible, offering farmers a number of alternatives.

Program benefits include price-support loans averaging \$1.25 per bushel nationally on the participating farmer's wheat production, domestic marketing certificates worth 75 cents a bushel on as much as 45 percent of the farm allotment's normal yield, and export marketing certificates worth 20 cents a bushel on as much as 35 percent of the farm allotment's normal production. What diversion payments will be based on one-half the county price-support loan rate and the normal yield of the farm if this is requested. Storage under bond of wheat produced in excess of the farm allotment may be arranged at the time of the signup. Growers who wish further information about these or other provisions of the 1965 program may obtain details at the ASOS County Office.
