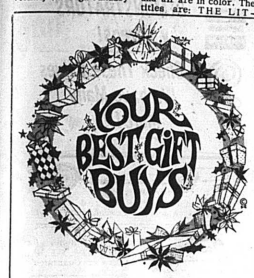


Cincinnati Art Museum Open

During the Christmas holiday season the Cincinnati Art Museum will be open to visitors every day except Christmas Day, with weekday hours of 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday and New Year's Day hours 2 to 5 p.m. Classes will be recessed on Saturday mornings, December 19, 26, and January 2, and on Tuesday evenings, December 22 and 29, but all permanent and temporary exhibitions will be open during visiting hours. Admission is free at all times.
Temporary shows for the holidays include: 19th Annual Exhibition by Artists of Cincinnati and Vicinity (through January 3); The Mr. and Mrs. Rosa W. Wootter Collection of 20th Century Biblical and Religious Prints (through January 31); Prints by Antonio Fraconi (through February 7). Of special holiday interest are the paintings and sculpture of Christmas - related significance in the permanent collections of Medieval, Italian, Spanish, and North European art, to be seen in adjoining galleries on the second floor.
On Tuesday, December 29, the Museum will present the annual Children's Holiday Film Program, an open house of charge, with identical performances offered in the auditorium at 1:30 and at 3 p.m. In co-operation with the Public Library's Films and Recordings Center, and all in color. Titles are: THE LIT

Light History Told

The story of the first Christmas tree lights involves a telephone switchboard, a telephone employee and a near tragedy. C. A. Harris, local manager of Southern Bell here, told how all this happened about 50 years ago.
In the early 1900's, people still lighted their Christmas evergreens with wax candles. The flickering glow of candlelight on the spicy needles was a beautiful ... but dangerous.
One Christmas season Ralph E. Morris, an employee of New England Telephone Company, had had a scare. His little boy Leavitt, crawled under the family Christmas tree and upset a candle. Luckily, it only singed his hair, but his father said immediately, "No more candles!"
Without the candles, the tree had no warmth and sparkle, so Morris set about to find a safer way to light the tree. As a telephone employee, he was able to buy several dozen switchboard lamps. He soldered the little bulbs to a string of wires. Then he wrapped colored paper around each bulb—but not touching the glass—and anchored it to the base of the bulb and the wires. The tree shone brightly. Little Leavitt was delighted—and so was Ralph Morris. Everyone admired it. And the idea spread.
Today's beautiful trees owe a lot to the imagination of a telephone man.
