RESOLUTION OF THE BAR OF THE EIGHTEENTH JUDICIAL DISTRICT
As a part of the system which our country inherited from the mother country of England were many well defined customs and practices which, though they were not a part of the law itself, have been accepted as a definite and a substantial contribution to the law and the justice for which we live.

One of the great traditions of our court procedure is that the presiding judge and judges should wear judicial robes as a part of their court attire. This practice is followed by all judges in the United States courts and a great many of the judges in the courts of various states including Kentucky. It is true of both appellate and trial judges.

It is the belief of members of the bar of this judicial district that the wearing of a judicial robe by the presiding judge and judges would add dignity to the court and be a substantial contributing factor in the maintenance of order in the courtroom.

At a meeting of the members of the bar of the Eighteenth Judicial District, Nicholas, Pendleton and Harrison counties, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved: We request our Circuit Judge, Honorable John P. Lair, to wear a judicial robe on all occasions when presiding in any of the courts of the district.

Everyone is cordially invited to attend these services. Resolved: That a copy of this resolution be spread upon the records in the clerks' offices of the respective counties in this district and be published in the newspapers in the county seat towns.

Accounts rendered by the Council were paid on a motion by Councilman William Harper, second by Councilman Paul Garrett, with the exception of two invoices which were held over for action at a later date when funds from the new revenue lease issue will be available.

Mayor Powers expressed his gratitude for the cooperation of the retiring council members. Harper and George Moreland, who was absent. Mayor Powers noted that his administration with Mr. Harrell covered ten years.
