Turnip green, kale, and collards are good sources of riboflavin as well as of vitamins A and C. Lima beans, peas, and young cowpeas including blackeye peas contribute appreciable amounts of thiamine and protein. Make full use of vine-ripened tomatoes in summer when they are plentiful and inexpensive. Tomatoes that ripen on the vine out-of-doors in summer sunlight are twice as rich in vitamin C as those grown
