## 18 Year Olds To Take Exams

Kentucky Selective Service Local Boards will begin in July to order 18-year-old registrants for complete examination by the armed forces.

Col. Stephenson emphasized that the examination of 18-year-olds does NOT mean that they face induction in the immediate future.

The examination of 18-year-olds who are out of school and not deferred for other reasons initiates a program announced by President Johnson on January 5, 1964. The President directed the Secretary of Defense and the Director of Selective Service to begin the early examination of 18-year-old registrants after a presidential task force study determined that large numbers of young men being found disqualified for military service were interested in obtaining education, vocational, and rehabilitation.

In announcing the plan to examine 18-year-olds, the President pointed out that early examination will enable those who are qualified for military service to plan intelligently their future careers in this respect. It will enable those found unqualified to get to work promptly on the education, training, or health services which can be of benefit to them.

## Doctor Warns Against Use of Hyperventilation

The death of a 14-year-old Lexington boy who was using "hyperventilation" as an aid to underwater swimming has brought a warning from a Lexington anesthesiologist.

The physician warned that use of the technique can be extremely dangerous.

The method consists of breathing deeply and rapidly before swimming under water, which decreases the blood's level of carbon dioxide and temporarily relieves the urge to breathe.

"Since the lowered carbon dioxide level prevents the urge to breathe from becoming overpowering, the blood oxygen level can decrease to the point that the swimmer becomes semi-conscious or comatose, and he then gasps and drowns," he pointed out.

He suggested three steps to prevent such occurrences: "1. Never 'hyperventilate' more than three deep breaths before swimming under water.

"2. Never swim with chewing gum or food in the mouth. A sudden gasp may suck them into the windpipe and plug it tightly. Reassurances following this circumstance would be impossible ordinarily.

"3. Always make sure the underwater swimmer has someone observing him from above the water so help can be available immediately. Another swimmer standing in the pool cannot get to the drowning person quickly enough to tell if real trouble is occurring. The swimmer may be moving but may be semiconscious and in serious trouble. If he doesn't surface promptly, get him out of the pool."

The anesthesiologist said such rules will be posted at the Lexington YMCA pool, and should be posted at every community swimming pool.

## Dr. Reynolds Continues As Health Officer

The State Health Department has relaxed its mandatory retirement order for employes 65 and over and will permit county health officers to continue working.

Dr. B. F. Reynolds will continue to serve as Health Officer of Nicholas County.

However, the officers will have to work on a contract, instead of salary basis, if they are 65 or more.

The State Board of Health recommended that when necessary counties be permitted to contract with health officers 65 and over for one year.

Health Commissioner Russell Teague said it was felt that creation of 11 vacancies might jeopardize health programs in some counties. The retirement order affected 11 county health officers.

The order supplemented one issued by Gov. Edward T. Breathitt.
