Ivan Jett, executive vice president of the Kentucky Retail Federation, announced today that the retailers of Kentucky have started an Anti-Shoplifting Drive. Jett, retailers regret that this is necessary, but due to the increase in shoplifting, both by adults and "teenagers," this has become necessary. He went on to say that very little shoplifting is done because of actual need. This is especially true among teenagers. Usually the teenager takes the item merely because he desires it, "taking a chance" in the latter case the teenager throws the item away after he steals it. In some instances however, the item is taken for resale purposes or in order to be a member of a club that requires stealing. Jett suggests that parents should question their children carefully if they come home with an item that they say was found or someone gave it to them.
