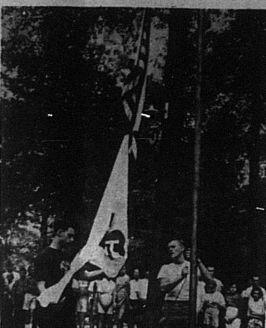

## FARM & HOME

**Livestock Field Day At U. K.**  
The annual Livestock Field Day will be July 13, at Coldwater Farm in Lexington. We will review the year's research work of the department plus some new information on animal diseases and parasites. This is one way to keep abreast with the rapid amount of knowledge needed in farming.

There will be a special 4-H Livestock program for youth at the field days this year. 4-H livestock members along with adult farmers are urged to attend. Free lunch will be served.

**Left-Over Pesticides**  
Many farmers are asked about left-over pesticides. Most folks want to know if the chemicals left over from last year are still good enough to control the pests. The chemicals may be effective under certain conditions. If you had your materials stored in a cool, dry place and the packages are tightly closed, chances are that most materials purchased new last year are still good. They should be used first, however.

**How To Use The**  
Many questions are asked about left-over pesticides. Most folks want to know if the chemicals left over from last year are still good enough to control the pests. The chemicals may be effective under certain conditions. **How To Water The Garden**  
When you water your garden, be sure to do a good job. Frequent light sprinkling or irrigation favors shallow root development and causes moisture to be lost through evaporation. When you apply water to your garden, soak the soil to a depth of 6 to 8 inches. Watering will vary with the soil type. Light sandy soils dry out more quickly than heavy soils.

older leaves. Affected plants may recover and develop a normal green color in the upper leaves. Sometimes recovery is incomplete or occurs so late that both yield and quality are adversely affected.  
Affected plants take up too much manganese. Manganese is a necessary plant food in small quantities. On very acid soils, where the pH is 5.2 or lower during a part or all the growing season, manganese may be released from the soil in amounts greater than tobacco and some other plants can utilize. When tobacco is grown year after year on the same field with annual applications of large quantities of acid-forming commercial fertilizers, many of Kentucky's tobacco soils become too acid not only for tobacco but other crops.

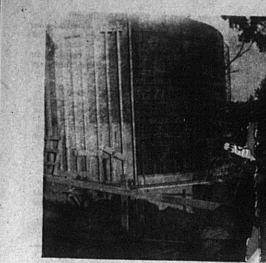

**NATIONAL ACREAGE ALLOTMENT FOR 1965-CROP WHEAT**  
A national wheat allotment of 49½ million acres for the 1965-crop has been proclaimed by Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman, according to R. O. Wilson, Chairman of the State ASC Committee. It is the same as the 1964 allotment.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture simultaneously announced the allocation of the allotment among the States. All except Hawaii are listed as commercial wheat States. The 1965 wheat allotment for Kentucky will be 172,049 acres, down by 2,247 acres, from

The national allotment has been apportioned among the States on the basis of acreage needed for production of wheat during the 10-year period 1964-65, with adjustment for abnormal weather conditions. The U. S. Department of Agriculture simultaneously announced the allocation of the allotment among the States. All except Hawaii are listed as commercial wheat States. 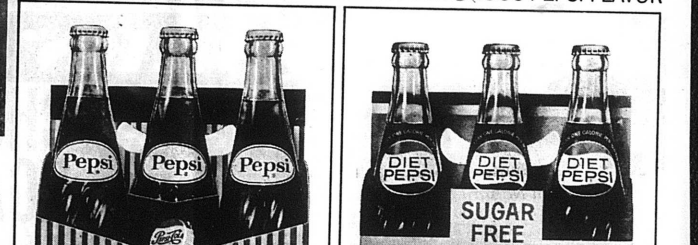
