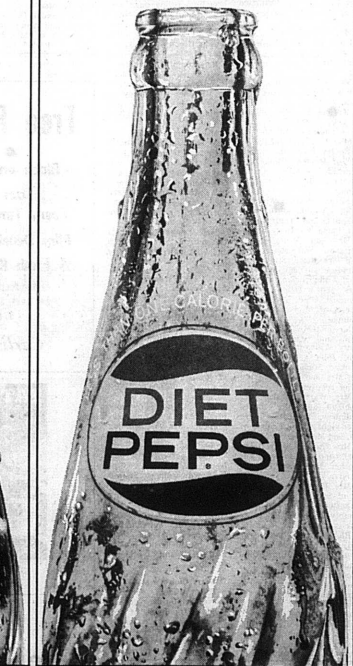
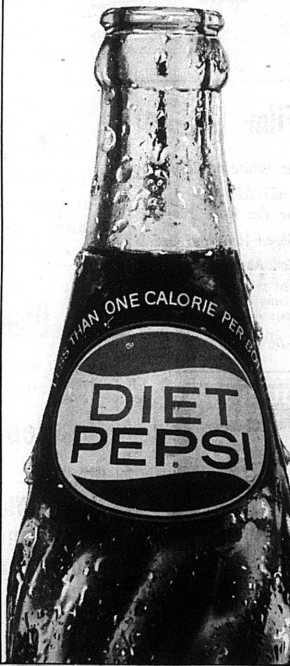

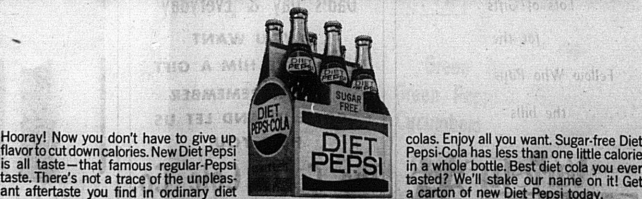

**Nicholas County Memories**

**BLACKBERRIES**  
Nicholas County, Kentucky was for a long time noted for its blackberries and more recently for the annual Blackberry Festival, where oddly enough, Festival visitors seldom saw any blackberries. The visitor from out of town should at least have an opportunity to sample blackberries in one form or another. There might even be a Festival stand where the ladies could pick blackberry jelly or preserves, or even blackberry pies or slices of blackberry jam cake. This is merely a suggestion.

Supermarkets with their frozen foods, cake mixes, and all kinds of fancy jellies and preserves, have relieved the individual family of the responsibility of preserving fruits and storing goodies for future out of season enjoyment; blackberries for example.

In the days of my childhood blackberry time was an important time in our family of four growing boys and a widowed mother. On the days that blackberry preserves and jelly provided delicious spreads for hot biscuits through the long winter months when the blackberry picking time came around mother gathered together several large paper bags (we called them buckets) for storage and smaller ones for the pickers, and after loading them and the boys into the family buggy behind old Charley, we set out for the Clay farm where briars and blackberries were plentiful. Arriving at the Clay farm we each took our cup or small pail and scratched our way into the briars in search of berries. By afternoon our larger buckets were filled with berries, and we were covered with scratches, a few ticks, and a lot of chiggers, but we had the makings of preserves and jelly as well as for a delicious blackberry cobbler which was to be our immediate reward upon reaching home. Mother specialized in making blackberry preserves rather than jam. In preserves the shape of the berries is retained, surrounded by the thick sweet syrup, whereas in jam the berries and syrup are all mixed up. Mason jars were not so common in those days so mother's preserves were put in stone jars of one quart or two quart size with the quart size with the tin cover sealed with melted sealing wax which was poured hot in a groove in the top of the jar over the edge of the cover. As the top of the cover is hardened effectively sealing the jar. A label pasted on the jar identified the contents for future reference. While blackberry cobbler was greatly enjoyed during the blackberry season, the jelly and preserves in the following winter months proved a greater treat, especially when the preserves were incorporated in a delicious jam cake. If there is any cake that can beat a jam cake with caramel frosting I should like to know what it is. My Nicholas County memories will always include blackberries, chiggers, and jam cake, all closely related.
