Apple sauce has no season, it is available in green and deep yellow vegetables, and citrus fruits.  
The best way to be sure of having the right type and the desired amount of fertilizer available when it is needed, is to order early. Also, it is good management practice to take advantage of dealer discounts on early spring supplies.  
Here are some suggestions to follow when storing fertilizers: Give fertilizer to breathe by leaving air space between each stack of bags. Always store in a dry place. Don't lay bags on a dirt or concrete floor since they will pick up moisture and "go rancid." Don't stack fertilizer over eight bags high. Keep away from water and "oil" contamination.  
Top-dressing with fertilizer for plants—not animals.  
Most soils in Kentucky need annual applications of phosphate or potash to provide high yields and maintain stands, says George D. Conder, U. K. Agr. Extension Service soils specialist.  
Top-dressing with fertilizer should be done this spring, he says.

### Twenty and Forty-five Years Ago

#### Thursday, March 30, 1944

Goodies! Microns sold \$15.00 from Goodwill on the Carload to Nicholas County Red Cross War Fund Drive.  
The National Therapeutic Dramatic Society of the Carlisle held its 44th annual meeting at the Hotel Carlisle on Monday morning, March 24. A large number of members were admitted to the water, its method of propulsion, and its controllability.  
The noise of a ship is carefully studied, too, because sound is beamed out into the water and can be detected by the enemy. Studies are conducted to locate noise and vibration so that they can be eliminated.  
The fast streamlined submarines that we have today are the result of studies in these fields, and the different shapes of the Taylor Model Basins. The lab also experiments with a new material for ships, especially for torpedoes.  
Prior to the atomic tests at Bikini in the Pacific, model tests were conducted in the Basin's test pond to determine the effect on ships of shock waves caused by explosions.  
In the aerodynamics lab at the Basin, scientists are working on "hover" craft. These vehicles, capable of great speed, travel a few feet above the surface of the land or water, held up by air.  
The Navy is interested in these air-cushion craft for military uses. As a result of this research, the Navy has built a 20-ton craft that has a speed of 70 knots (about 80 mph) and a towing basin three-fifths of a mile long, used to evaluate ship performance.
