**"They Want Thatway"** There was a time when land and water problems were mostly a concern of western farmers. Today there is hardly a state that is not faced with a tough decision involving the rights and uses of these resources and the conflicting interests of farmers, sportsmen, recreational, suburban builders and others.

A farm spokesman recently said that while farm organizations had provided leadership in many fields of agricultural interest, they had failed in the area of natural resources. Many times, he said, the federal government has moved in and completed projects of land for a project before local people knew what was going on.

The role played by the local farm organization in many of these instances is similar, he said, to the character in a TV western whose only aid to the posse is to say "they want that way."

One of the disadvantages farmers and other private landowners face in protecting their interests lies in the fact that there are 39 agencies of the federal government with authority to acquire private land. Ten of these have continuing land purchasing programs. Seven are moderately active at the present time in land buying, but could step up their efforts considerably on short notice. Some of these agencies need Congressional authority for their purchases, but many need only the money and the desire.

Currently, there is a drive for the federal government to purchase more land for recreation. These proposals range from Maine and Pennsylvania to Illinois, to Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky.

**Present-day cabinet-makers shudder at the colonial practice of painting walrus.** The colonists thought so little of the wood that they burned walnut trees when clearing land or split them into fence rails. Owners later valued black walnut for essentials such as cradles, gunstocks, and coffins.

The early settlers found walnuts growing 150 feet tall with branches bores of 90 feet. Today, a 100-foot tree is unusual. Though walnut is a relatively fast-growing hardwood, it takes half a century for a tree to reach cutting size.

Just 10 years ago, the Department of Agriculture noted that the consumption of black walnut, though fairly steady, was comparatively small in the United States.

In recent years the wood has become enormously popular for home and office furniture, paneling, shelving and the like. The demand in Europe, where supplies are inadequate, also has cut into the stocks of American walnut.

Walnut has even become something of a status symbol. The manufacturer of an expensive high-fidelity photograph cartridge prominently advertises that it comes in a small, solid-walnut box.

Black walnut (Juglans nigra) is prized for its dark, lustrous color and striking grain. The hardwood varies from light brown to a deep chocolate. The sapwood is nearly white, but it is now common to darken it by staining or staining.

Black walnut with alternate dark and light stripes, curved or wavy grain, and irregular growth patterns, is highly valued. Especially prized are burls from very old trees with a bird's-eye figure on a glossy dark background.

**Auto Safety Check Program**

Frankfort, May 7—A voluntary auto safety check program, giving every motorist a chance to do his part in making his community a safer place to live, was launched by Kentucky Governor Edward T. Breathitt.

With approval of the Kentucky Department of Public Safety headed by Commissioner Glenn Lovern, check lanes will be set up by communities throughout the state. Vehicles pronounced safe will be given a 1964 safety-check windshield sticker.

Upon affixing one of the stickers to his own car, the Governor urged all motorists to "check your car, check your driving, check accidents." Even our best drivers, he said, are poor risks when they drive with bad brakes, tires or parts.

Items to be checked in a national program sponsored by the Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee and Look magazine, include brakes, lights, steering, exhaust system, glass, windshield wipers and wipers, rearview mirror, horn and seat belts.

Designating the months of May and June as "safety check months," Breathitt in a proclamation said:

"All traffic organizations, public information media, service and trade associations, industries, schools and churches are hereby urged to take an active part in this traffic safety program, and
