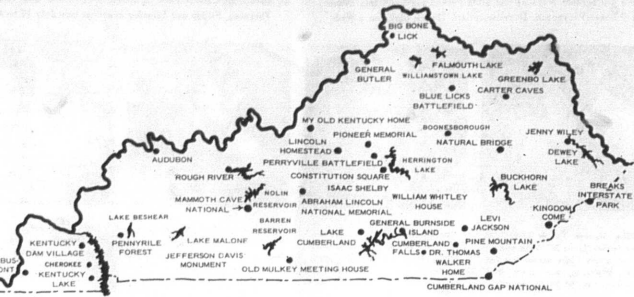

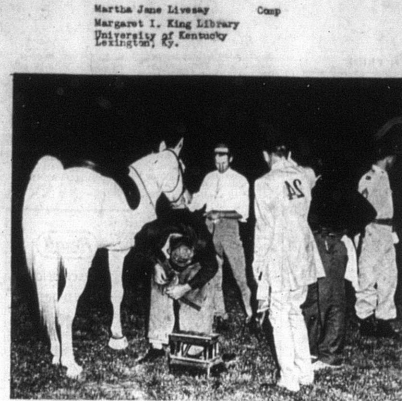

Raymond Wesley Jr. Granted Science Research Stipend

Raymond Wesley Jr., has been notified by Dr. Calvin Lang of the Department of Biochemistry of the University of Louisville Medical School that he has been granted a stipend of approximately \$600, from June 17 through August 23, to do research study under the National Science Foundation.

Wesley will be working under the direction of Dr. R. L. McGeehan and the research will be concerned with amylase enzymes.

Dr. Charles E. Wagner, Ph.D., Assistant Dean of the University of Louisville School of Medicine notified Wesley in April that he had also been awarded an Alumni Scholarship of \$500 which is for medical students during their freshman year.

Wesley went to the University of Louisville, Monday at the invitation of Dr. Peter Knoefel, professor and chairman of Pharmacology, to discuss doing graduate work in research in the Department of Pharmacology during three



summers. Upon successful completion, he would receive a Master's Degree in addition to his M.D. degree. This grant provides for tuition and a stipend of approximately \$600 each summer.

With a B.S. degree and a major in Microbiology, Wesley will be graduated May 18 from the University of Kentucky where he has taken his premedical training.

Lake Carnico Being Readied For Summer Season, Lot Sales

Officers, directors, and stockholders of the Nicholas County Development Corporation are literally working around the clock to get Lake Carnico ready for the summer season.

Emphasis is concentrated on setting of prices for lots which are to be offered for sale. It is hoped that an operation of the dam (the end of the corporation—and the public is urged not to later than June 1, where a person can get some idea of the entire lake area.

Improvement to the lake grounds is well under way, such as seeding newly cleared areas, road work, planting of a boat dock by the corporation—and the public is urged not to drive or walk in the seeded areas. These particular areas are the ground on top of the ridge leading from the newly constructed Galloway Hill road and lying adjacent to the road going to the Nicholas County Fish and Game Club, and groups of land lying along the new grade which starts at the end of the new dam and goes to the Hickory Ridge road.

A group of stockholders and officers of the corporation meeting Monday night are asking the public to refrain from putting gasoline engines and large motor boats in the lake until the question of size, type, horsepower, and number of motors to be allowed on the lake has been established by the Division of Boating of the Department of Public Safety, Frankfort.
