2. It was obvious from the testimony of the witnesses that there was a lack of co-ordination and regular faculty meetings as scheduled with the teachers, principals, and the Superintendent in attendance to acquaint each other with the common problems that might exist in the entire school system. It is the feeling of the grand jury that regular meetings of these people must be held with the education of the children is absolutely essential and that matters of policy can be established upon facts presented at such meetings that will enable a much more effective teaching program and that all of the staff will be appraised of the progress of the teaching program.

3. That all motor vehicles owned by the Nicholas County Board of Education shall be operated by authorized personnel only, and that the Board of Education shall issue a directive as to which authorized personnel shall be so, and those people shall be fully informed of that they are to use said motor vehicles for school business only and that there is to be no personal use made of them.

FARM & HOME

Cattle Backcrubber
A well made, properly placed backcrubber, soaked with a recommended insecticide, is an economical way to control horn flies. The horn fly is one of the major fly pests of cattle. Cattle will learn to treat themselves regularly if you place backcrubbers near areas where the animals loaf, feed, water, rest, or travel from farm to pasture. Backcrubbers also help control lice and other fly pests of cattle.

Materials used to make the backcrubber are found on almost every farm. You can buy backcrubbers already made, but they are very expensive. However, you can make your own.

Location is important as backcrubbers will be of little value unless you place them where the animal will use them. The number of backcrubbers needed per herd will vary with herd size and pasture area or other factors. One or more may be needed on a backcrubber will always be near a grooming shed or barn.
