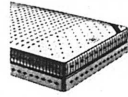


The root system of Annual Field Brome (left) is entirely different from that of wheat (right). Field Brome (left) added almost 8000 lbs. more roots per acre than wheat (right).  
On the farm of Clinton, Ky., near the Nicholas-Robertson cover crop, beside it, wheat was sowed for a cover crop. When turned under this spring, great difference in the root development was apparent. The added organic matter (roots) made the land easy to work and to prepare a seed bed. The soil will hold more moisture and the crop will benefit therefrom.  
In almost all crop production, an increase in organic matter in the soil results in increased crop production. Plowing under crops of great root development and top growth is needed to make the soil porous and available.  
For comparison, the approximate weight of roots of different plants per acre, for a depth of eight inches in Annual Field Brome 8000 lbs.; 50 Fescue 6500; 50 Bluegrass 3000; Vetch 1000; Wheat 800; Korean Lespedeza 600.

**FLEMING-MASON RATE REDUCTION IN JULY**  
Beginning with the July billing, 9,500 members of Fleming-Mason RECC will receive a rate reduction totaling \$50,600 annually.  
Announcement of the rate reduction was made by C. J. Ross, manager, after Albert Dicken, president of the rural electric cooperative had been advised that the Public Service Commission had approved the Co-ops' application for a rate reduction.  
"After review of the application, exhibits and their evidence of record, the Commission is of the opinion and finds that the rate reduction proposed by Fleming-Mason Rural Electric Cooperative is in the public interest and that the proposed rates and charges set out are fair, just and reasonable and should be approved."  
The reduction will amount to approximately 4% overall and will affect all types of service offered. It will be of special interest to those now having or who are planning to install electric heat.  
The reduction was made possible by a steady increase in membership in the cooperative and by the increased power load in the eight counties which it serves.
