Law and respect for law separate civilization from savagery. In this nation the breakdown in that respect approaches the point of crisis. The FBI reports show a steady increase in crimes of all sorts, including the most vicious and violent. There is no single cause of this, but many authorities consider major cause to be parental attitudes and a failure of training in the home. Wayne Nunn, administrative assistant to the governor of Oregon, recently touched on this in a speech dealing with the Labor Day riots at the resort town of Seaside, Oregon, which were duplicated in other communities across the nation. The riots were handled, at Seaside, but only because the authorities, profiting from past experience, were ready. Mr. Nunn made it clear that the riots were not, as some seem to believe, just the work of "youngsters 'letting off steam' just before the beginning of school." A substantial number of those arrested ranged in age from 21 to more than 25. This is every community's problem. **Letter from IYFE to Norway**

Dear family and friends,

I entered a Norwegian high school in early morning, ready to give a short talk about Kentucky. There was much excitement as I came into the school grounds with the boys and girls standing around the door as I entered. What a warm welcome, I was thinking, for an American girl! The students crowded around me for half an hour, until time for assembly to begin. The principal introduced me to the students, and I was fortunate to have had time to break out in the room one of the most interesting talks of the school.

The word has passed around the school that Princess Ann Maria from Denmark had come to the school and that she was very much surprised to learn that she was only an American girl indeed.
