Each tile is 5' in diameter and 1' long, and the depth of installation varies from 2 1/2' to 5'. Underground drainage is one of the best and most efficient ways of draining wet, poorly drained bottom land. The system was designed by the USDA Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Nicholas County Soil Conservation District and the Nicholas County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Many farmers in the county have installed tile to improve springs or wet weather in and to drain valuable tobacco land. "People will question my sanity when they see me installing tile in this dry and dusty ground," said John Jr., as he started the project before the recent rain.


