The Ellsville Homemakers met Oct. 7, with Mrs. Reese Smoot. The meeting was called to order and the rolled called.

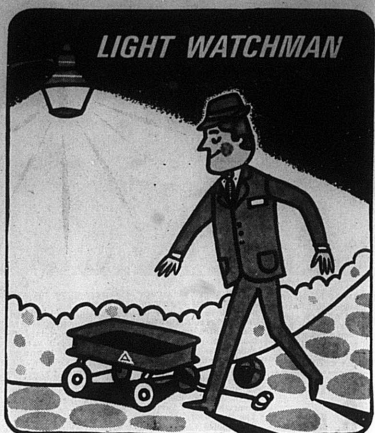

The newly organized Nicholas County 4-H Riding Club took its first ride last Sunday. The club met at the 4-H Camp. This was the first meeting for the group. D. W. Plans for the club will include regular club rides, participation in horse shows and learning how to care for and train horses and ponies. Present at this first meeting were Phillip Gillipie, D. W. On November 29 and the requirements generally are the same as for the archery hunter. On this area, however, only shotguns with slugs may be used. Hunters will be assigned positions at the check-in station. Either sex deer may be taken and in both the archery and gun season with only one deer permitted per hunter for both seasons. Reservations will not be accepted for the archery season, but for the gun season applications for reservations will be received, postmarked after 8:00 a.m. on November 7. Applications postmarked at an earlier date will not be accepted. Applications should list first, second and third choice dates. Also, there must be enclosed a self-addressed stamped envelope and should be sent to Tom Lewis, Dept. of Fish and Wildlife Resources, 202 Highland Dr., Greenville, Ky. The rabbit and quail hunting season will be on each Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday between November 19 and December 2 and between November 15 and January 15. The hunter must check in and check out of the check station and must

Controlled Hunting Plan Outlined

Frankfort, Oct. -- Additional hunting territory for deer, rabbit and quail will be available for Kentucky hunters this year through an agreement with the General Services Administration for the use of large sections of Camp Breckinridge for controlled hunting. Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has announced.

Through the agreement 11,000 acres in Union county have been made available for both archery and gun deer hunters. The small and rabbit territory consists of 16,000 acres. The bow and arrow season will comply with the statewide season, October 15 through November 15 with the same regulations applying as for statewide hunting (except there will be no hunting on Monday and Tuesday of each week.) In addition to a hunting license the hunter must have a Camp Breckinridge permit (no charge for the latter) and must check in and check out of the check station which will be located five miles east of Morganfield on Kentucky Highway 56. The check station will open at 5:15 CST and will close at 6:00 p.m.

The gun season on the 11,000 acres in Union county will open on November 26 and continue through
