

**Science Club Meets**

John A. Reagan, Department of Public Safety, Division of Accident Control, Frankfort, was guest on the program featuring "Safety" for the second meeting of the Science Club at the Carlisle School on Monday, October 23. Mr. Reagan showed two films on safety. One entitled "4-28" showed Governor Breathitt emphasizing safety on Kentucky highways.

The film depicted a two car crash which resulted in five deaths and a shattered life when the driver of the first car failed to see a high school boy beside the road.

The driver was restricted to glasses when driving on the day of the accident he failed to wear his glasses.

After the driver of the first car hit the boy the second car with four occupants crashed into the first car and the passengers with their two children were all killed. Because he failed to wear his glasses the driver would be a hopeless cripple for the remainder of his life and doomed forever to hear the crashing sounds which killed five innocent people.

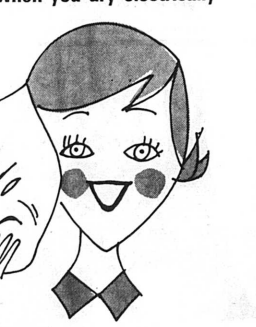

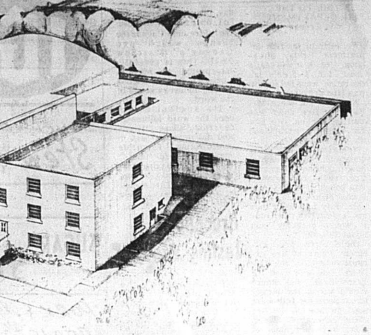
