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From the Diary of a Country Editor

Comes August, brings with it some thoughts of "old days," of the green ponds, sunny dunes, dry roads, dry fields, the sun on the road, more youthful minds come memories of days preceding the "Purity Movement," "taking up school" in September, carefree hours of "linked sweet-and-sour," "long draws and long legs." For how August did slip away and what a detestation of the "Purity Movement," Will Ardey, says he can "smell" August and we easily believe it.

There comes to us, as we write the income of the hemp, the rich perfume of the ripened grape, the heavy sweetness of the pump, the prematurely picked and teased into artificial pinking in nests of dry grass, the drowsy sun on the road, the fields, the hot dry smell which come to the sportsman, crouched to his "blinds" of weeds or hemp along the edge of mill race, the "Purity Movement" for the dove to run the gauntlet of guns on whistling wings.

And our ears, too, are aware of the coming of the final month of summer. One is conscious of its stillness at noon, a silence which is almost sound. And throughout the long afternoons and still nights, the winged little folk, the crawlers, the hoppers, the "male flowers" that "maken melody and slegen al ye night with open eyes," set up their swan song—valiantly vail in the face of approaching change.

Nature, like a wholesome mother, blessed with many children, happy in the fulfillment of her destiny, folds her hands for a space and enjoys the completion of her fecundity. She smiles, and yet there is a sadness in her smile, for the leaves of the poplar already begin to drift to earth and here and there in field and forest, scarcely noticeable in the glorious abundance of warnings of the Change.

In the thought that it is but change, may not we, her unloving children, find solace, and achieve the healing comfort of a simple faith? . . .
"A thing of beauty is a joy forever
Its loveliness increases: it will never
Pass into nothingness."
So Keats might have sung, had he looked into the glossy leaves, had he come within a few feet of the wind-whisper near which, whose branches are green, the leaves are bright, the light is flecked through the cool depths of its greenery, the honey-buzzes give the illusion of breathing, the rise and fall of leafy breasts. And not so fanciful after all is this illusion, for trees breathe in the sunlight and the air strikes in the leaf the chemical changes which send such a ripen sap transformer to nourish root and bark and woody fibers. Just what that chemical change is, how the sap rises, defies all laws of gravity, the wisest have not learned. Just now the tree under the delightful repertoire from a saying branch under sun-flecked leaves, why only in this song and one wonder if this may be the bird whose first



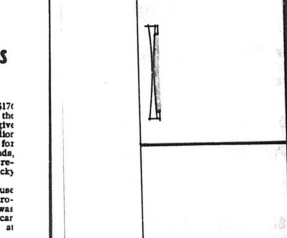
*Groundbreaking Site: Take Hwy 226 from Hwy 60 southwest of Farmers, Ky.

Farm & Home

Fond weeds are a major problem interfering with fishing and fish production in many ponds. The old problem of catching more weeds than fish can be remedied if proper practices are followed.
Weed control should begin at the very start of pond construction. Unwanted weeds are most prevalent in ponds with excessive amount of shallow water. If the water is shallow enough for sunlight to penetrate to the bottom, then unwanted weeds are sure to grow.
To overcome this problem new ponds should be constructed so that there is very little water with a depth less than three feet.
If the pond has already been constructed, two other weed control practices may be used effectively.
One method used to control weeds that grow beneath the surface of the water is proper fertilization. Commercial inorganic fertilizer used to increase human quality of water can also help keep weeds under control by increasing plankton production. Plankton may retard plant growth by shading the surface of the water that penetrates the water.
However, if these plans are already a problem, the necessary precautions are probably off the most satisfactory means of destroying them.
No single herbicide is effective in controlling all different types of weeds. For this reason, it is essential that the weed or weeds to be killed are identified and the proper herbicides applied in the correct amounts.
Most herbicides will not cause apparent harm to fish, livestock, or game. If the necessary precautions are taken. But it is most important to use these methods on a safe and some may be harmful. The safe way to destroy bacteria is by applying length of time.

Better Roads Council Issues Statement
