

**Squirrel Season Begins Saturday**  
Frankfort, Special-Kentucky's 110 day squirrel season will open on Saturday, August 14, amid speculation that this should be one of the better hunting years, Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, reports. This year the hunters for Mr. Bushnell will have 16 additional days and for the first time in several years the season will be seen the zone system which caused much confusion. Although the season has been split into two parts, the same dates hold for all sections of the state, the Commissioner said. The first phase will continue from August 14 through October 31, while the later season will begin on December 1 and continue through January 31. The bag and possession limit is again six per day with 12 in possession after two or more days of hunting. According to reports

received by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, not all sections will be blessed with an abundant crop of squirrels, but the overall outlook for the state is generally good. The most flood crop is better than average this year with an abundance of berries and nuts reported in many sections. The second phase of the season was set to accommodate the hunters who use a dog to tree the squirrels, but during the month of December most of the foliage has disappeared and the dog and hunter are better able to spot the squirrel. While many hunters prefer this type hunting, the great majority stand by the old methods of "stalking" or "sitting out" the squirrel. The stalker is the person who creeps silently along in the woods, spotting the squirrel at some distance and then approaching, without being spotted, until he is within shooting distance. The "sit" is the hunter who places himself as a strategic spot and waits for the squirrel to feed, and then waits for his quarry to appear.

**CHILDREN UNDER 16 NOT TO WORK ON FARMS DURING SCHOOL HOURS**  
Farmers around Lexington were reminded today that children under 16 years of age are prohibited from working on farms only outside school hours, under Federal law. This word came from Lillard Trice, Supervisor of the Lexington office of Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division, U.S. Department of Labor. He said the Fair Labor Standards Act prohibits minors under 16 from working in agriculture during school hours for the school district where they live while working. This applies to children who are migratory workers as well as local children.

"The place for children is in school, not in the fields," Trice added. "Today's children will grow up in the world which demands more education and better skills. Schooling now will open the door to opportunity in the future." Trice pointed out that the 16-year age minimum does not apply to children who work on the home farm for their parents or guardians. He also said the Act places no restrictions on farm work by minors 16 years old or over.

Compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act does not excuse non-compliance with State or local law. "The Wage and Hour Office in Lexington will be glad to answer any questions about the Fair Labor Standards Act," Trice added. The address is 113 Fuller Building, 120 W. Second Street.

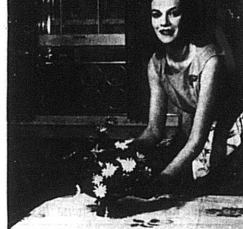
