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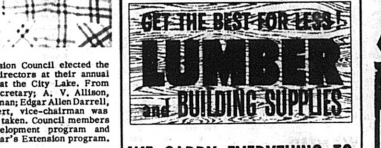

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autability is given for each soil for the production of wood crops and agronomic crops and wild life. The engineering properties of the soils are also classified. For a given soil, Taff stated, the woodland section recommends the tree species to plant in an existing woodland and species to be planted in new fields. For each woodland soil the reports tells which trees will best produce and thus should be favored in management.

In the horticultural section, we learn that Allegheny soils are suited for the production of apples, peaches, grapes, certain small fruits, vegetables, and nut trees. Tyler soil loam is not recommended for any of the above mentioned crops. Huntington hill loam is not suited for apples, peaches, and grapes, but is well suited for vegetables and nut trees. Taff reported.

The agronomic section places each soil in its capability class and limitations are identified. Soils suitable for use in row crops, pasture and hay, and their required treatment and management are described, according to Taff.

The Senate bill would increase the annual loan fund available under the Farmers Home Administration, and it adds a new provision for making grants up to 50% to associations organized to finance water facilities for rural areas. Additionally, the Senate voted to make eligible areas primarily irrigated in agriculture, with less than five thousand population. Senator Cooper strongly and successfully opposed the effort to lower this population limit.

Senator Cooper said, "I am glad the Senate has voted to extend this program which means so much in many areas of Kentucky, and I am glad that assistance will continue to be available to plan and build water facilities to meet the needs of our rural families." The bill now goes to the House for action.
