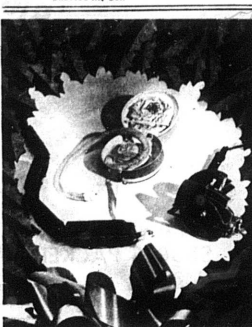

### New Product Added

During the past month we have begun production of a disposable surgical cap in the Sanitary Products Department. This garment is made of non-woven fabric and will be sold as a one-time wear item. We are now running six machines, six days a week on this operation. After the operators' training period is complete, we will be producing approximately 1,000 dozen per day. At this time, it is anticipated that we will need 43 operators to produce our production schedule on this item by the end of 1966. Mrs. Christine Gray, Product Director of this department, reports that the following people are now employed on the newest Blue Grass product: Randa Cox, Susan Hutchinson, Genevieve Fricke, Mildred Ritchie, Martha Jane Highland, Hilda Jane Will, Lida Trowel, Betty Craycraft, Everett Ritchie. An insulated aluminum panel, 6.032" thick will cover the entire roof on schedule and the weather-resistant material carries a 20 year guarantee against structural and material failure. If the material arrives on schedule and the weather cooperates, the roof will be completed within the next three days. The masonry construction is progressing nicely and is about 65% complete. The block being used is Carter Hard-burn Industrial tile and matches the original blue Gray building. The roof will be an insulated metal panel, rather than tile. This can be easily removed to allow for any future expansion program of Carlisle's first plant.
