## Ranger Finds Viet Nam Service Almost Unreal

Lt. Campbell Has Several Local Relatives

Two Bourbon County youngsters became the youngest and third persons to die on the U.S. 27 curve during the weekend when the car in which they and six other Paris youths were riding left the highway three miles south of here and struck the end of a guardrail, State Police said.

Miss Betty Katherine Campbell, 19, of Thatcherville, and Leroy Puckett Jr., 19, of 917 Cypress Street, were dead on arrival at the Bourbon County Hospital at 12:25 a.m. Sunday.

Also injured in the crash were Cindy Finley, 16, and Peggy Bartlett, 16, who were listed in satisfactory condition tonight at Good Samaritan Hospital in Lexington, and Pat Wellington, 15, who was listed in fair condition tonight at Bourbon County Hospital, Paris.

Lt. Campbell, a 1963 graduate of the University of Kentucky who has been serving with the 1st Cavalry Division in Viet Nam since September 1964, said that now that he is home it all seems like a bad dream.

"It is difficult to fight in a war when the goals are not clear cut. There is no front and you never know who the enemy is and who isn't," the Ranger lieutenant said.

"Many times we would draw fire from the enemy when we were near him. Some of our young men would be there, but unless you found a weapon, there was no way to prove who was responsible. You really can't trust anyone," Lt. Campbell said.

"One time a little girl walked up to some men who were near me. She was concealing a grenade which killed her and wounded some of the men nearby. Another time I saw an old woman offer two sergeants a can of water. It was booty trapped by the men."

"I believe that it will either develop into a major conflict, or end in much the same way as the fighting in Korea."

Some of the experiences related by the lieutenant had a slightly bitter tone. He stressed his belief that most of the American public does not seem to realize the full implications of the sacrifices being made on the battlefield.

He feels there are too many young people returning from the wars in Viet Nam and that the people are not really getting a clear picture of what is going on. "News reports are often blown out of proportion," he continued.

Lt. Campbell said he felt the information given the public was not educating them as to the real cost of the war. "Despite the headlines," he said, "they just don't seem to realize that men are dying over there."

Now that the "bad dream" is over, the lieutenant said his plans were not yet made for the future, but that he would begin investigating some job opportunities at the first of the year.
