The Constitution Revision Assembly will submit its recommendations sometime in January.

Recommended changes in the judicial structure, leaving county office organization to the legislature, and appointment of the superintendent of public instruction are all separate battlegrounds for spirited debate.

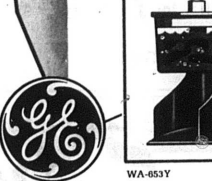

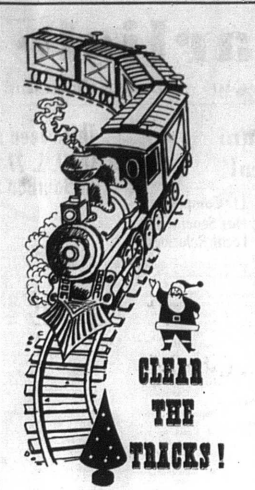
