

Opening Dates Set For State Parks

Frankfort—Opening dates for nine vacation-type Kentucky State parks, which were closed this winter, have been announced by State Parks Commissioner Robert D. Bell.



First to open on March 15 will be Lake Cumberland, near Jamestown, and Rough River, between Hardinsburg and Leitchfield, both said.

Three others will open April 15. They are Audubon, near Henderson, Kentucky; Mt. Vernon, near Hartsville; and Natural Bridge, near Paducah.

Opening May 1 will be Buckhorn, between Hazard and Booneville. On May 15 Carter Caves, near Olive Hill; Pennyrite Forest, near Dawson Springs; and Pine Mountain, near Pineville, will open, Bell added.

The other four vacation-type State parks remained open throughout the winter. They are Kentucky Dam Village, near Gilbertsville; Jenny Wiley, near Prestonsburg; General Butler near Carrollton; and Cumberland Falls, near Corbin.

A nine-hole golf course is to be completed at Pine Mountain State Park in time for the opening, Bell reported, and another nine-hole course is under construction at Audubon.

Kenlake Hotel, at Kenlake State Park, will have a \$100,000 renovation program completed by the end of the year.

NEW PROGRAM The Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund has just announced a new program designed to encourage more young physicians to locate in ten Kentucky counties where there is a critical need for physicians, according to C. Howard, M.D., Glasgow, chairman of the Fund's Executive Committee.

The new program has two parts. Doctor Howard said in making the announcement in Louisville today, following a meeting of the Fund's Executive Committee. One of the programs is designed to assist interns getting out of training in June; the other is set up to aid students entering the medical schools of the state.

grow plants with artificial lights at home. Use of artificial lights make it possible to grow some flowering plants and green plants anywhere in the home.

The new welcome additions in winter include such common plants as wax begonia, rex begonia, fuchsia, African daisy, violet, gladiolus, dracaena, Kiefferbachia and peperomia, says Jack Buxton, UK Ag Experiment Station horticulturist.

"Fluorescent lights are best suited for this purpose, he says, since quality of fluorescent lights more nearly approaches that of sunlight. Some plants, however, take incandescent lights. Commercial fluorescent fixtures may be adapted for this use. Two tubes should be enough light for a growing area 2 1/2 feet wide and the length of the tube. Hang

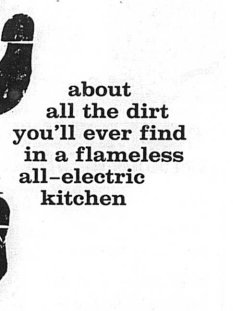

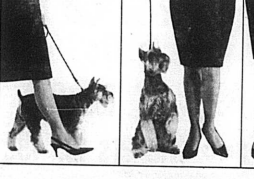
