Farm Notes

FARM PACTS JANUARY 1965 - NOT A GOOD YEAR. Farm income in 1964 might show up quite well in the statistics of Kentucky agriculture, but most farmers will tell you that it has been a rough year for a majority of them. The full effect of a smaller tobacco crop (about 13 percent less than 1963)

and the resulting lower cash income will be fully felt until after the market closes in early 1965. Neither will lower livestock prices be reflected in total income figures. Larger numbers marketed might bring more total dollars, but production costs have again increased faster than income, leaving a small profit for labor, management and investment.

On top of these economic problems, the drought was more general and severe than usual. State-wide, corn yields were down by 9 bushels per acre, amounting to a near 12 million bushel decrease. On our own farm, corn yields were only 1/3 of those in 1963 and our soybeans were a total loss. There was not enough moisture to sprout the seed. Pastures and hay crops were generally poor and more feed will have to be brought into the state.

WHAT ABOUT THE FUTURE? Despite present low livestock prices, this type of farming still offers the best opportunity for the average operator to increase his income. Prices will soon adjust themselves and stockmen who improve their herds, their pastures and management will

be in a better position to profit by the upturn in prices. We do not know the future trends of tobacco.

Tobacco is the problem crop in Kentucky, but change heavy over the heads of producers. Overgrown growers reduced their planted acre by 10 percent in 1964 and the dry weather cut the yield another 8 percent; total production last year exceeded consumption by about 60 million pounds.

The supply of burlap is estimated to be 1.1 million pounds—5 percent above last year and an all time record. We are simply producing more tobacco on our allotted acre than the market can take and something will have to be done to keep supplies in line or havoc will result.

Acres of cotton have been only partially effective. During the past 10 years a yield has increased by 1/3. Even with the drought last year we produced almost as many pounds on 307,000 acres as we did on 421,000 two years earlier. Farmers will have an opportunity in late February to vote on marketing quotas and price supports. They should do a lot of thinking on the problem before then.
