Lake Carnico Progresses; Safety Rules Outlined

The public is urged to visit Lake Carnico area of Nicholas County and observe the progress being made in this recreational area for Nicholas County. The officers of the Nicholas County Development Corporation have spent many hours trying to get this area ready for use by the general public and while it still is not in its complete form, a good many advantages are now being enjoyed.

A public picnic area has been arranged in a wooded section about 300 feet from the Dam, located just beyond the swimming area and it is lighted at night for the convenience of persons who might be caught by nightfall before leaving. It is hoped that picnic tables can be placed in this area before too long. The Department of Fish and Wildlife, which stocked the lake with fish asked that no fishing be permitted in the lake this summer and acting in accordance with this request the general public is asked not to fish in the lake and not to go frogging in an effort to give the fish and wildlife a chance to become

more abundant. Many persons are already using the lake this summer for swimming and boating. A boat launching driveway has been built and people who bring boats to the lake are asked to use the boat launching ramp provided. Also, the public's attention is called to the fact that there is a restriction on the size of motors to be used on the lake and no motor larger than a 5 1/2 horsepower is permitted. This limit on the size of the motor was also worked out in conjunction with the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Division of Boating of the Department of Public Safety. At present anyone swimming in the lake is doing so at their own risk and signs have been erected stating this fact. For this reason anyone wanting to swim in the lake is urged to take every precaution and, no one should swim alone. The public is urged to have some competent swimmer in their group if they want to use the lake.

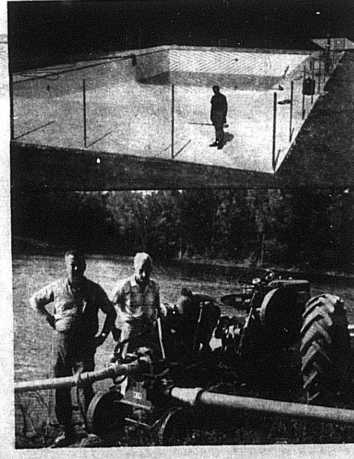
A road has been built leading to the swimming area and the public is

asked to park their cars at the end of the road and not to go beyond the piles of sand, in what is now the beach area itself. The cars drip oil as well as take up space and this condition detracts from the beach area.

A number of people have been enjoying horseback riding on weekends at the lake and some complaints have been received that the riders may be crossing over lots owned by private individuals. Anyone riding horses in the area is urged to follow the many ridges around the lake and not to go across the lots as many of the lot owners are endeavoring to clean and seed the lots. The riders are welcomed and the Development Corporation personnel urges them to continue to enjoy the area in every way possible.

Historical Markers

A Historical Highway Marker erected at Moorefield to commemorate a historical event of the Upper Blue Licks will be dedicated by the Lexington Lafayette Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution at Moorefield, Saturday, July 3, 9:30.

The marker located at the junction of the Upper Licks Road (Ky 57) and Ky 26, in the corner of the Methodist Church lawn, has the inscription: Upper Blue Licks August 12, 1782, Capt. John Holder and 17 militiamen overtook band of Wyandots on Great Salt Creek (Licking River) six miles N.E. The Indians had captured two boys, James Hoy and Fred Calloway, near Booneborough. In return that took place Holder lost four men, and being outnumbered he withdrew without retaking boys, Hoy captive seven years, Calloway not so long.

"This week a second Historical Marker was erected on the lawn of the courthouse," announced Mrs. Raymond Wesley, chairman of historical markers for Nicholas County since 1963. "Two years ago Nicholas was listed as having no historical markers. Now we have four. Last summer one was erected at Forest Retreat, home of former Governor Thomas Metcalf and others are scheduled to be erected soon."
