## National Safe Boating Week

There has been a vast increase in recreational activities of all kinds in this country, a result of the combination of higher family incomes and increased leisure. Boating has been among the leaders. It is enjoying a boom of sensational dimensions. Just as exciting as the boat's water, enough to float a bill. And boating is a fine and healthful sport.

"The 'It'" has to do with safety. For boating accidents and casualties have soared too. And their root cause is ignorance of the basic rules that spell safety.  
During the July 4-10 period National Safe Boating Week is to be observed. It certainly is needed. Here are a few of the fundamental rules and precautions that every boater, regardless of the size and kind of his craft, should observe: Don't overload. This is one of

the surest roads to disaster. Carry at least one Coast Guard Approved life-saving device for each person aboard a motorboat.  
Children should always wear buoyant water-clothes or life jackets when conditions are hazardous. Parents should be taken in the morning pants, various removers, etc.

"Pouring gas from an auxiliary can near the motor tank is considered dangerous spills and the release of gas should be taken in the morning pants, various removers, etc.  
Watch out for other craft and if you're in a narrow channel, you may be causing trouble. Learn various distress signals.  
Learn the rules and the laws—and, beyond that, use your common sense.

**PESTICIDES IN THE HOME AND GARDEN**  
Approximately 15 per cent of all pesticides used are purchased for home and garden use, and last year totaled over 50 million pounds of insecticide preparations. By controlling insect pests, these chemicals help make possible our modern way of life.

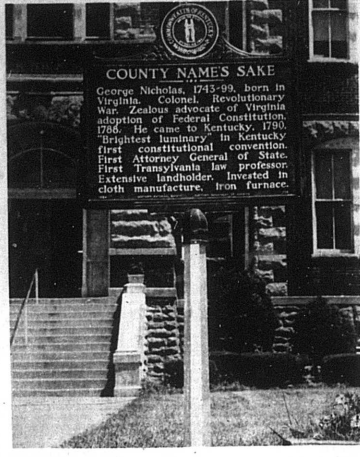
The aerosol bomb, now a commonplace method of disseminating insecticides in the home, was invented during World War II as a means of pest control. **FOOD AFFECTS YOUR PRE-SCHOOL CHILD**  
Building a strong body is an important part of getting ready for school. To build strong bodies, to grow and develop properly, children need the right food. A child who is fed when he is hungry feels well cared for and secure. A well-nourished child has a better chance to learn. Help your child establish good food habits which may lay the foundation for good health throughout life.  
Food and feeding affect many parts of a child's life as he grows stronger and is better able to work and play. His mind—he learns much through the process of feeding. He also learns about new foods—how they look, taste, smell, the different ways foods are served, mealtime being a happy time, and getting along with people as he eats with them.  
Many children eat small quantities of food so snacks between meals are important to satisfy hunger and help meet the daily body requirements. Snacks which do not interfere with the child's appetite for meals are best and should be given 1 1/2 hours before mealtime.
