



NATIONAL SAFETY AWARD TO K. U. — For placing second in safety among 37 electric utilities of similar size, Kentucky Utilities Company was honored by the National Safety Council and presented an award by Howard Fyle (right in photo), NSC president and former two-term governor of Arizona.

The presentation was made to James R. Thompson, K.U. system safety director, at the West Virginia Statewide Safety Conference and Exhibit Charleston.

The award covered the company's 1964 safety records which show an accident frequency rate 60 per cent below the national average for electric utilities.

K.U. vehicles had an accident frequency rate of 57 per cent below the national average for utility fleets during the last 30 years, they have travelled 115 million miles without a fatal injury to a company driver. Employees of the company have worked more than 19 million man-hours since the last fatal injury.

The 1964 safety record earned six national awards. The National Safety Council, Edison Electric Institute and the Bureau of Safety each recognized the record of a million man-hours without a disabling injury for two separate periods during the year.

General Office employees in 1964 completed their tenth year without a lost time injury. During the decade, they worked almost four million man-hours.

Fleming-Mason RECC has over 9,000 members in the eight county area it serves.

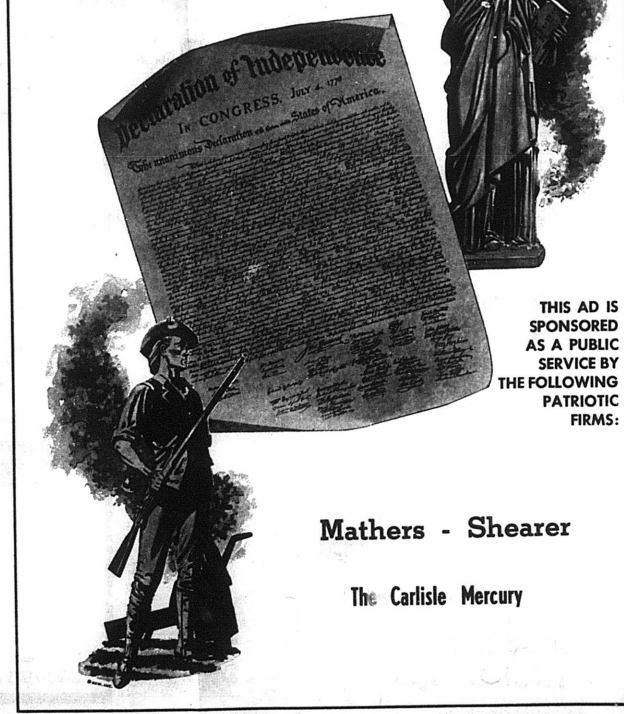

Phone Bill Lower Jan. 1

Telephone bills in Nicholas County will be lower because the excise tax revision law signed by President Johnson reduces the Federal excise tax on local long distance telephone service.

"This is good news for telephone customers," said C. A. Harris, Southern Bell's manager here, "because the entire savings from the reduction will go to telephone customers."

The first and biggest portion of the excise tax reduction, the rate will be 3 per cent beginning January 1. An additional 1 per cent will be removed each January thereafter until the tax is eliminated in 1969.

Southern Bell customers in Kentucky will pay an average of \$15.63 for federal excise taxes per year.
