Farm & Home

The Nicholas County Livestock Improvement Association has planned a Beef Cattle Tour for Saturday, July 31. Management of the herd, production of leader calves, insect control, and other important phases of beef production will be discussed.

MINERAL BEVERAGES: Put in shady spot near water. Put loose salt free choice) in one section, ground limestone in a second and steamed bone meal in the third.

Research has shown these four minerals (calcium, phosphorus, sodium, and chlorine) are the only ones that must be supplied for proper animal nutrition on Kentucky farms. They must be supplied for all times for proper calf growth and normal beef production.

BACK-RUBBERS: Put one for every 20 head of cattle in pastures to control insects. Locate them near shade and water to get maximum use.

To determine if chiggers are present you might place a piece of black cardboard edge-wise on the ground. Observe it for a few minutes. If chiggers are present, they will climb to the top edge and congregate there.

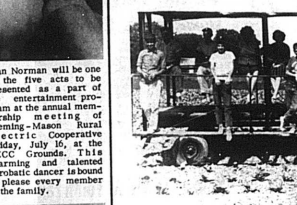
