## Farm & Home

TIPS ON USE AND CARE OF TELFON  
Cooking utensils coated with Teflon are now available under many brand names, and homemakers are often uncertain about the right way to use and care for this cookware.  
The non-stick, easy-to-clean qualities of Teflon-coated utensils have the biggest advantage. No special directions are needed for cooking in a Teflon-coated utensil. No special recipes are needed for cooking in a Teflon-coated utensil. The use of butter, oil or shortening is not necessary to prevent sticking, but you can use them if you wish. The same cooking temperatures and general guides for cooking with other utensils apply to Teflon-coated cookware.  
Extremely high temperatures should be avoided, as a Teflon finish discolors when heated. To avoid discoloration, grease; add the finish from constant overheating. The finish is the unattractive and, in time, destroy its non-stick qualities.  
Wash the new cookware or the bakeware in detergent or soap, rinse and dry it, and then "season" it by applying a thin film of salad oil over the surface with a paper towel.  
Minor scratches from everyday use do not affect the non-stick qualities of Teflon, although they detract from its appearance. However, digging into the surface with sharp metal utensils or using a knife to cut foods in a Teflon-coated pan can cause gashes in the finish, destroying the non-stick surface there. For this reason

avoid using metal spoons, knives, or spatulas when possible.  
Plastic, wood or rubber tools do not scratch the surface and can be quickly more freely. Many Teflon-coated utensils are sold with a wooden or plastic spatula.  
Coolware coated with Teflon should be washed in hot, soapy water with a sponge or soft cloth, rinsed with hot water, and dried. Even when the utensil looks free of food after using, wash it with soap or detergent.  
If a Teflon utensil is just rinsed under water than washed well, grease can build up on the surface and affect its non-stick quality. These utensils can be put into an automatic dishwasher. If you use one, be sure they wash so easily, this usually takes up valuable dishwasher space unnecessarily.  
Never use metal scraping pads on the surface. Store Teflon-coated utensils carefully to avoid scratching the surface.  
Inadequate cleaning or cooking certain foods can cause staining of Teflon. To lighten the stains, boil a solution of two tablespoons baking soda, one-half cup acetic acid, and one cup water in the pan; then wash and dry it. After this treatment, the surface needs a wipe with salad oil before the pan is used. Special stain removers for Teflon also are available. Occasional treatment with a non-abrasive sponge or paper towel, also can be used to lighten surface stains.

Tobacco Crop Cultivation Discussed By UK Specialist  
The crop needs some cultivation, but there are some precautions producers should take. In cultivation, it is important to break up the ground crust and control weeds. However, in later stages of growth, cultivation could do more harm than good, since the root system is becoming larger; root-pruning is more damaging to the crop than any benefit derived from continued cultivation.
