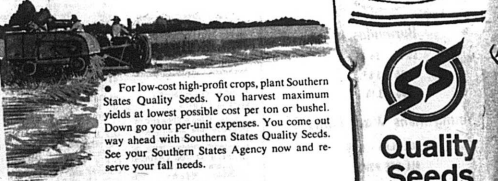

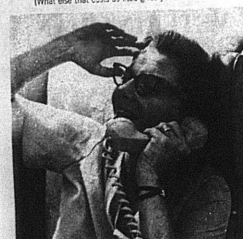

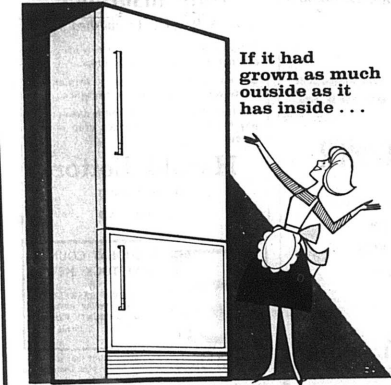

that the Senate Appropriations Committee voted last week to restore \$10 million which the House of Representatives had cut from the rural housing repair program that has been of much use in Kentucky.

Senator Cooper successfully appealed to the full Committee to put back the money after it was removed by the House. The Committee members told him he made a strong case for once again appropriating these funds for grants of up to \$1000 for home repairs and improvements to remove hazards faced by families with low incomes and to improve the overall health situation in their communities.

The Senator noted that the House denied requests for funds for the program both last year and this year, he was glad the Senate Committee had now restored the money.

"This program had meant much to employment and to health and safety for families in many counties in Kentucky, and I will fight to maintain this amount in the Senate, where I believe we will be successful," said Senator Cooper.
