

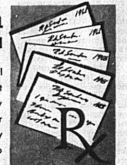
OUT OUR WAY

TESTING—To insure that all electrical insulators installed on streets are operative and free from defects, tests and treatments are made on each of them. Here, Kenneth Nashmore (foreground) and Abe Stanley Cavell use a heavily made test stand to check the efficiency of an insulator prior to its installation. Their shop also checks components such as starters, generators, retracting motors and conduct decelerated tests by using a highly sensitive and precisely calibrated instrument.

Cavell is assigned to the 15000 Field Maintenance Squadron at Hickham Field, Hawaii.

Said insulators are made of glass and mineral collectors, general science teachers, and beginning students of earth science should find our latest publication of considerable interest," commented Dr. Wallace W.
