"If we didn't have grass, we'd not only lose our topsoil—and with it the fertility of our fields—we'd have no firm foundation for our crops. The silt clogging streams, the soil erosion, our reservoirs would soon be full of silt and we'd be short of drinking water and water to irrigate our farms and industries."
