From the Diary of a Country Editor

Up to meet a friend from home, I like to join up for a brief trip to Cumberland Falls and after a delicious luncheon at the country club, where descended upon me a paid Curtis Alcock, for twenty-five years secretary of our association, and Bob Ekin, long editor of the Central Record, who says this is the "superstitious list" is made a life member, we say goodbye to our hosts and are off, back-trailing on the old trail over which the first settlers of Kentucky fought their way to emerge at length into the comparative safety of the open lands at Crab Orchard.

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Five years ago I visited Cumberland Falls for the first time, making the trip from Corbin over more than twenty miles of mountain trail before the new road then under construction was possible throughout its length. As I stood for the first time on the shelving rock overlooking the majestic rage of tumbling waters, as I faced the curvilinear water, and soon to like a slim diamond crescent in its jewel casket of wooded hills and glimpsed the surpassing beauty and grandeur of the gorge and sensed the imperishable mood that had gone into its making, I felt myself both humbled and exalted by the majesty of such supreme artistry. Here was power, majesty and grandeur contrast with quieter beauties, here was the heart-ravishing sweep of an unseen power, brooded over by the voice of everlasting life. Here, as someone has fittingly said, "The voice of God is never hushed."
