

McNeill Completes Duty Tour

Flemingburg, (Special) Peter T. McNeill, Director of Member Service and Staff Assistant of Fleming-Mason BECC recently completed a four-month tour of duty as a Power Survey Team in Korea. Mr. McNeill obtained a leave of absence without pay from the local Co-op to join the group.

The Survey Report will be used by the Agency for inter-branch cooperation with the United States Development (AID) the United States Operations Mission, and the government of South Korea.

His objective was a study of all phases of the electric power situation in Korea and Mr. McNeill, as Rural Area Economist, made a study of how the farmers of Korea would use electricity and how it would affect the economic and social conditions of the country.

The study was made to design a system which would serve as much of the country as economically feasible over a 20 year period.

When Korea was warring, Korea to help themselves and eventually become self-sufficient and self-supporting.

He brought back a great many slides and hopes to share his experiences in Korea with youth clubs, schools or organizations who are interested.

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Black Light May Be Answer

Kentucky's rural electric cooperatives have always been sensitive to the needs of those who serve. By working through and with other organizations, the cooperatives have played a vital role in various industrial and recreational development projects. In keeping with their new "Let's Speak Up For Kentucky" program, these rural electric cooperatives have pledged to increase their efforts to build a better and more progressive state and have invited other groups and individuals to join with them in this effort.

Any attempt to strengthen Kentucky's economy must pay special attention to agriculture. To again your rural electric cooperatives have alerted the USDA to a problem which captures crop-destroying insects through the use of a fluorescent-type lamp emitting near ultraviolet light. In this light, the insects are attracted where they are trapped.

Before offering the trap for statewide use, it was necessary to test it thoroughly. Kentucky Electric Association with the University of Kentucky, assisted by County Extension Agents in installing numerous traps late in 1964. Even though these traps were liberal in their praise of the new traps.

Research on the traps has been in progress for a number of years. For example, the 64-day conducted near Oxford, N.C., showed that the light traps reduced the tobacco hornworm population by 50 percent the first year, by 80 percent the second year, and by 80 percent the third year.

After reviewing the USDA research and some preliminary tests of their own, Kentucky's rural electric cooperatives are now prepared to offer this new device on a statewide basis.

In addition to the elimination of the tobacco hornworm, the resulting improved climate, the blacklight trap has many other advantages. For example, it is economical and dependable. The cost of operation is less than one cent a day for one 15-watt lamp. Installation costs are negligible, and the original cost of the equipment is offset by the savings than the cost of one application.

Fire Truck Runs Total 750 Miles

Teton and Harry Wagener, chairman and Charles Watkins, treasurer, who were in charge of soliciting funds and purchasing the truck, turned the papers and records over to the new trustees. The truck has been in operation almost a year and Chief Woody Wilson reports 7 fire calls have been made. Five houses, 7 outbuildings and 4 other buildings have been saved from destruction. An estimated \$25,000 in property has been saved from being burned. The fire chief reported the truck had run a total of 750 miles making calls in the county.
