

Community Woman's Club

The Carlisle Community Woman's Club was organized in 1948 as the Younger Women's Club under the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs. In 1960 the present name was adopted, with the four departments: Community Service Dept., Music Dept., General Dept., and Literature and Drama Dept., and six standing committees.

The club at present has twenty-seven members who, with the assistance of other civic-minded people of the city and county, have sponsored and supported many worthwhile projects. Members of the Community Council and the Carlisle-Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce (since 1958), the Woman's Club has worked, in cooperation with other civic groups.

As sponsors for one of the Scout Troops we have furnished paint for the Girl Scouts and are purchasing a regulation size tent for the girls. Plans are to establish a regulation size tent for a shelter and kitchen for the Girl Scouts as one of our projects.

For several years the club members have canvassed the City of Carlisle for Heart Sunday for the Heart Fund. We have contributed to CARE and the Arthritis Foundation. We have made gowns and sashes for babies in the local hospital. First Aid training classes were sponsored by the Woman's Club; for two school sessions a county child was taken to Lexington for speech therapy classes; we gave twenty-five dollars to help send a local girl to the University of Kentucky for a year in the 4-1 club; and several other projects.

In 1961 we chartered the Carlisle Junior Woman's Club of which we are very proud.

Each year we sponsor a high school student in the F. W. Sewell Center at the Music Center. In 1963 a club member won the Sewell Contest on the state level.

Through the years we have tried to meet current needs, such as sponsoring a Medico-Aid (Emilio) educational program, attending college seminars on "Self Improvement for Quality Service," helping with Family Life Conference, donating to Radio Free Europe and Dimes for Liberty, the latter helping Kentucky state in furnishing a book to the base of the Statue of Liberty for the American Educational Museum, filling Christmas stockings for the Ft. Knox Hospital and Nicholas General Hospital in Louisville, giving donations to the Ky. Society of Crippled Children, Cancer Fund, Folio, and Red Cross.

In conjunction with the Carlisle Senior Woman's Club we furnished a room at the Nicholas County Hospital and in 1956 gave twenty-five dollars for the TB Sanatorium in Paris, bought safety tape for bicycles, sponsored a Youth Center in 1958, sponsored Christmas decorating contest, sponsored a weekly breakfast at the Nicholas County Hospital, sponsored a medical observers Corps Civil Defense from 1956 to 1958, gave \$25 to the Carlisle High School Band to help pay expenses for appearance in the Kentucky Derby Parade, gave \$35 to the Little League, bought equipment for a high school student, and in 1964 we entered a Community Improvement Program, compiling a scrap book which is presently in the Nicholas County Library.

Because of all these projects required money, the club members have earned the money in many ways, the most successful of these being the sale of foil wrapping paper, the annual sale of home made candy at Christmas, making dolls and doll clothes, promoting bazaars, box suppers, square dances, food sales, amateur programs, rummage sales, min-

strel shows, and flower arrangements, giving ice cream suppers, raffling county hams, selling household books, Betty Crocker Cake Mixes, Fruit Cakes, and sponsoring a hat party.

The Community Woman's Club manages to keep busy and feels that it is helping to improve the community which we are fond of.
