

Nicholas County Memories

On my recent visit to Carlisle I noted with interest a group of young people enjoying an evening of dancing and dancing in what was formerly Turneman's Drug Store. The scene at this location from the days when the evening between the entrance of the mail at the Post Office 20 doors up the street, and the closing time of the store, a select group of the town's young men gathered there to enjoy their after supper cigars and away yams, many of which if published would bring winners even today.

That was after Mr. Coburn's father, Mr. Tom Turneman had died and Coburn had taken over the store. He enlarged it, installed a new gas-lighting system and completely refurbished the store with beautiful golden oak fixtures and cabinets, a feature of which were the glass cases on both the North and South walls, and the waist high glass case forming a hollow square in the center of the store.

Back of these cases was the elaborate archway window on one side by the description counter, and on the other by the Office. Beyond the archway to the West was the Soda Fountain, usually one of the first if not the first initial installation of its kind in Carlisle. Through a door at the right of the fountain was the store room where were always stored the various things were the ice cream freezer, the gas tanks required for the sodas, plus the syrups and other supplies.

On a warm afternoon or evening one could buy bottled pop at other places, but a Coke in a glass of crushed ice at Turneman's as dispensed by Hadden Howell, or in later years by Allen Hopkins, seemed to be the most and most refreshing treat the nickel
