how limestone helps keep your farm productive

When you apply limestone to your farm land you accomplish several important things at one and the same time.

1. You replace the calcium and magnesium (lime) that have been lost through cropping, erosion, and leaching.
2. The acid condition of your soil, that has developed as the result of the loss of lime, is corrected - that is the soil is "sweetened."
3. The activity of favorable bacteria is stimulated; the decay of organic matter, such as manure, straw, roots, and stubble, is hastened; and the nitrogen-fixing process is promoted.
4. Other plant foods, especially phosphorus, are kept in more available form.
5. Soil structure is improved; heavy clays and silts are made looser and easier to work.

SECRETARY FREEMAN ANNOUNCES 10,000TH WAR ON POVERTY RURAL LOAN

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has announced that the Farmers Home Administration has made the 10,000th rural "war on poverty" loan.

Freeman said the first 10,000 rural Economic Opportunity loans totaled about \$17 million.

The loans, made through Farmers Home's 1400 local county offices in the States, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, are repaid over periods up to 15 years at 4-1/8 percent interest. A parallel program of loans to rural cooperatives, made for periods of up to 30 years, also supports projects aimed at benefiting low-income rural families.

About two-thirds of the funds loaned has gone to farmers to refinance debts on real estate, purchase needed land, acquire machinery and other equipment, improve farm buildings and purchase livestock.

The remainder of the funds has enabled rural people to take up or increase a wide range of non-agricultural income-producing activities, including machinery and auto repairing, welding,

ceramics, sewing, wood cutting, carpentry, handicrafts, furniture repair and refinishing, roadside marketing, and outdoor recreation services.

The Secretary noted that seven states and Puerto Rico have had the greatest lending activity to date. Latest state-by-state tabulations show Mississippi had made 739 loans, Texas 700, North Carolina 599, Georgia 442, Tennessee 420 and Kentucky 397. Puerto Rico had all states with 1,280.

In the light of the first six months experience, Freeman said, "this part of the President's program is providing a direct, practical and rapid method of reaching some of the nation's most disadvantaged people, those who have been least helped by the affluent society everyone talks about."
